Let's Visit New York City!

With a skyline that's recognizable worldwide and more than 8.3 million people from all corners of the globe who call it home, New York City is a one-of-a-kind destination. Each of the five boroughs has its own distinctive flavour, while individual neighbourhoods, streets and even single blocks maintain identities all their own. Whether it's your first visit or your hundredth, there's always something new to see and do. From world-class dining to shopping to nightlife to culture, New York City's streets pulsate with an unmistakable rhythm that attracts more than 45 million visitors annually.





Empire State Building;

Take a panoramic view of New York City from its highest viewing point. High-speed elevators bring visitors up 1,050 feet to the 86th-floor observatory, where you can look out at the city from the comfort of a glass-enclosed pavilion or brave the openair decks lining all four sides of the Empire State Building.

Times Square

Not sure where to look while walking through world-famous Times Square? Don't worry, you're not alone. The expansive stretch is a feast for all five senses—including massive digital advertisements that make Las Vegas pale in comparison, star-studded Broadway shows, people peddling jewelry on the street and, of course, the Naked Cowboy, who plays music in his tighty-whities.





Central Park

Designed by Frederick Law Olmsted and Calvert Vaux between 1858 and 1873 and currently maintained by the Central Park Conservancy, the 843-acre park is an urban oasis of trees, gardens, rolling meadows, arches, sculptures and statues. The range of outdoor activities you can enjoy there is seemingly endless, from hiking, biking and ice-skating to simply lounging on a picnic blanket and listening to a live concert. The most popular attractions is the Central Park Zoo.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art (The Met)

Located on the border of Central Park, The Metropolitan Museum of Art is one of the largest and most comprehensive art museums in the world. With over two million works of art spanning 5,000 years, the Met presents the best of human creativity from around the globe. From the splendors of ancient Egypt, to the spectacular New American Wing, to the Met's beloved Impressionist paintings, a world of great art awaits you at NYC's most-visited attraction. The collection and special exhibitions are free with museum admission.





Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum

Housed in one of the most iconic buildings in New York, the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum's collection is filled with prized pieces, including works from Pablo Picasso, Wassily Kandinsky and Joan Miró. The Guggenheim always presents interesting and innovative exhibitions, and the museum's layout is like no other, as visitors experience the artwork along a huge ramp that spirals up around the entire interior of the cylindrical building.

The Jewish Museum

Located in the Warburg Mansion on Museum Mile, the Jewish Museum is a captivating voyage through time, following the journey of the Jewish people over thousands of years through art, artifacts, photography and video. In addition to providing a valuable resource to the community, the museum also sponsors performances and lectures and annually presents the New York Jewish Film Festival.





Museum of the City of New York

This institution contains a wealth of city history and includes paintings, sculptures, photographs, military and naval uniforms, theater memorabilia, manuscripts, ship models, toys and rare books. The museum explores all New York things, from the actual buildings, apartments, parks and streets that make up its urban landscape to the cultures, people, sights, sounds and styles that give it its unique and unmistakable personality.

American Museum of Natural History

Packed with exhibitions representing people and animals throughout the ages, the museum also has a planetarium and an IMAX theatre, as well as a special visiting exhibitions and plenty of places to eat and shop. The dinosaur wing is a must-see, and if you have time, lie down under the life-size model of a blue whale in the Milstein Hall of Ocean Life.





Museum of Modern Art (MoMA)

The Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) is not only devoted to presenting the best in contemporary art, but also to promoting the understanding of modern art and expanding the definition of what is considered "art" in the first place. Whether it's showing you something you've never seen before, or showing you how to see something familiar in a new way, MoMA is always an eye- and mind-opening experience.

Madame Tussaud's Museum

Sing, dance and mingle with more than 200 celebrities in Times Square. For over 200 years, Madame Tussaud's attractions worldwide have invited guests to get up close with incredibly lifelike wax figures of pioneers in the entertainment, music, sports and political arenas. From Marilyn to Madonna to Miley Cyrus, there is a star for every generation. Who do you want to meet?





Ellis Island

First port of entry in the United States between 1892 and 1954, more than 12 million immigrants arrived in America via this island. Walk the Great Hall, feel the spirit of the hopeful arrivals waiting to begin their new lives and see photographs in the American Family Immigration History Center, where you can also search ship manifests for passenger names.

Statue of Liberty

The Statue of Liberty was a gift from France on America's 100th birthday. A universal symbol of freedom, the copper-plated sentinel stands 305 feet tall from the bottom of her base to the tip of her torch. Though you can see the Statue from land, the short ferry ride to Liberty Island will bring you up close and personal and give you access to the monument's pedestal and observation deck as well as the crown.





Yankee Stadium

The new home of the New York Yankees measures a mile in circumference, and the venue is practically a self-contained city. In addition to the baseball field, the Yankee homestead has a museum, many bars, Steak House, Hard Rock Café and a hotel.

Brooklyn Bridge

The iconic Brooklyn Bridge recently celebrated its 125th anniversary. A walk across the elevated pedestrian walkway on a warm day provides a true New York City experience.





The National September 11 Memorial & Museum at the World Trade Center

The National September 11 Memorial & Museum at the World Trade Center are scheduled to open on September 11, 2011. The memorial will honor the nearly 3,000 people who died in the attacks on February 26, 1993, and September 11, 2001 (including those who were killed in Pennsylvania and at The Pentagon). The museum will house exhibitions with artifacts, pictures, videos and accounts from people from around the United States and the world, amounting to a jointly told history of September 11, 2001.

Apollo Theater

Apollo Theater stages its famous Amateur Night—over the years, the Apollo has hosted performances by such stars as Ella Fitzgerald, Jimi Hendrix, Bob Marley, The Strokes and comedian Tracy Morgan.





NYC's comedy clubs

Host headliners and rising stars every night of the week, and sometimes a big name will make an unexpected late-night appearance at one of the smaller venues.



Broadway

Broadway, refers to theatrical performances presented in one of the 40 large professional theatres in the Theatre District. Broadway is usually considered to represent the highest level of musicals in the English-speaking world.
